

Read Genesis 24:17-25

17 The servant hurried to meet her and said, “Please give me a little water from your jar.”

18 “Drink, my lord,” she said, and quickly lowered the jar to her hands and gave him a drink.

19 After she had given him a drink, she said, “I’ll draw water for your camels too, until they have had enough to drink.”

20 So she quickly emptied her jar into the trough, ran back to the well to draw more water, and drew enough for all his camels.

21 Without saying a word, the man watched her closely to learn whether or not the LORD had made his journey successful.

22 When the camels had finished drinking, the man took out a gold nose ring weighing a beka and two gold bracelets weighing ten shekels.

23 Then he asked, “Whose daughter are you? Please tell me, is there room in your father’s house for us to spend the night?”

24 She answered him, “I am the daughter of Bethuel, the son that Milkah bore to Nahor.”

25 And she added, “We have plenty of straw and fodder, as well as room for you to spend the night.”

After the woman filled up her water jar and came up from the well, what did the servant do (v. 17)? He hurried out to meet her.

What did he ask her? Will you please give me a drink from your jar?

What was the first thing she did (v. 18)? She gave him a drink.

What did she do next (vv. 19-20)? (Read) She got water for his camels also.

What does that tell us about the woman? Since each camel could drink as much as twenty-five gallons of water, it showed she was kind, and willing to help a stranger. She was a hard worker.

What did the servant do (v. 21)? He watched her. **Why?** He was trying to decide if she was the woman the Lord had picked out to be his master Isaac’s wife.

After she gave the camels enough to drink, what did the servant do (v. 22)? He gave her presents of gold jewelry.

What did the servant ask her (v. 23)? Who is your father and do you have room for us to spend the night?

How did she answer the servant (vv. 24-25)? I am the daughter of Bethuel and we have lots of straw for your camels and room for you to spend the night. She was willing to share whatever she had.
